"The Triumph of the Knights" Our 6th Crusade

What is the significance of the reunion name? For those of you just joining us, we offer a bit of history of our organization.

It all began in 1999 with the casual statement by Max Elliott. "Everybody is celebrating the 50th anniversary of their graduation with a class reunion, but I won't ever have one because my school is gone." Thus began a plan. In 1999, we started with the 1958 yearbook and using the various search engines and the names, we began locating former cadets. Max joined forces with Thornton Ridinger (1959) who turned out to be a

neighbor and soon we joined forces with Andy Staley and Tim Tyndall (1968) and Robert Mouro (1966) who were also actively trying to locate others. Andy made the job easier for us by undertaking the Herculean task of scanning every FMS yearbook onto a CD. Using these CDs we attempted to contact each and every Faculty, Staff and cadet listed. The information about those located was entered into a database that we still maintain. (see book. "Florida Military School...The History")

The first gatherings were small but after locating a few, the numbers gradually grew. The first real reunion type gathering was in 2000 at the Tomoka Oaks Country Club in Ormond Beach, Florida. That event was originally planned for a smaller location but interest grew and we had to move to larger quarters at the last minute. We were surprised to have about 100 people in attendance, both former cadets and faculty members and their spouses.

From this gathering a group was formed to write formal By-Laws and plan for a *Lollapalooza* in October 2002 to be held near the old school site in Deland Florida. On April 10, 2003 The Florida Military School Association, Inc., a Florida Non-Profit organization was official.

The time consuming search to locate former cadets continued. From the CD of the yearbook, Sue made a data base of every name to form a master working list. By the time we had our big Reunion in October 2002, our first Directory was in print. That reunion lived up to its name and had a turnout of 284 people. The Ghost Tour was born and cadets could now walk the former grounds of the school with pictorial stops along the tour. A Hanger Dance was the highpoint of the Saturday evening activities. The Memorial Service was held outdoors at the old columns on Sunday morning, complete with bagpiper. A Memorial Plaque was unveiled on the columns commemorating the existence of the school.

In December 2003, 22 cadets and friends sailed for 7 days aboard the Carnival GLORY. This was a mini reunion event.

Demand was such, that another big reunion was planned for 2006 at the same Deland location but ii was held during the summer months to

encourage more families to come.. In the interim, more of the remains of the FMS buildings disappeared from their site, so the Ghost Tour and Memorial Service was held inside at the Holiday Inn. This was *the Golden 50th Reunion*.

By 2009, "The Return of the Knights" found us changing the location of our reunion to the Holiday Inn Express in Daytona Beach. They had a lovely pool and resort like campus and our contact, Lillian Hess, has relocated to this hotel so we were able to get affordable rates. Again, we had an excellent turnout and instituted 50th .anniversary observances for the graduating classes. The reunion was also known as The Founder's Reunion. A special dinner was held on Friday night honoring the first classes, and video interviews were recorded.

Two years later, 2011 found us back at the Daytona location for a repeat performance. This reunion was known as "Knights of the Renaissance". Again, the next group of classes were honored on Friday night and more video interviews were recorded. (Thanks to the Schaefers).

That brings us to 2013. This is our 6th reunion and thus our 6th Crusade for the Knights. "*The Triumph of the Knights*" means we have been able to overcome all obstacles and are able to join together again.

Sadly, our ranks continue to decrease with the attrition of age. Those in the earlier classes are at a stage in their lives that it is now time for some of those in the later classes to pick up the mantle and carry on. Our Association is self-limiting and at some point, it will fade away just like the school. Don't wait to attend a reunion or you may find out that you are too late and they are no more. Make your reservation today and join in the camaraderie.

BACK IN THE DAZS

THE LANCE - December 1967 -

THE OLD MEN AND THE SEA

A recent Saturday morning starting at 5 a.m. for the cadet officers of FMS for it was at this time our fishing trip began. Though still droopy-eyed from our abbreviated sleep, we were all ready to venture forth toward a day of fun and relaxation on the waters of Lake Beresford.

We arrived at Hontoon Marina, on the St Johns River, around 6 am. By this time, everyone was eager with anticipation of the days catch, though none of us really believed that we would catch much. .We had divided into groups of three and picked our boats by numbers, not knowing which boat we had picked. We loaded our boats, and backwards as it may seem, we roared off into the sunrise, some of us a little slower than others. Eventually, though, everyone made it to the lake.

Major Pendarvis had given us tips on how to fish the lake. Being the avid fisherman, he said he, "can sometimes tell where the fish are by the smell." But, as stubborn as some of us are, we had ideas of our own.

Most of the morning went fairly smooth. Several of the boats did pretty good, seeing it was their first time out. Anyway, we all rendezvoused on a peninsular across from the marina around noon. We compared catches with one another and as if it wouldn't figure, Majors Pendarvis and Dinkins had the largest stringer of around 25 fish. We just couldn't figure it out! Some of the boats did not have any, and here they were with 25. The largest catch by any other boat was 11.

The afternoon had good results for some and poor for others. We became a little more relaxed too. If you happened to be a civilian out for a ride on the lake, all you could see from the six boats that I know of, were several cane poles and about three pairs of legs sticking out from the side of each.

Around 4:30, we all decided to return to the peninsula to the marina. We arrived back on campus by 9:00 p.m.

It goes to without saying that we all had a great time and we are all ready to go again, Major Pendarvis. . . . by Cadet to tally up our catch and feast on our hard day's work. Major Dinkins was on hand with his

camera to record our day for the rest of history, and, after a brief picture taking session, we divided up into two groups, one to clean the fish and the other to get the fire going and cook. Then came the crowning event, we ate . . . and ate! After the feast came the inevitable, we had to pack up and leave. We cleaned up a bit and went back to the marina. We arrived back on the campus at 9:00pm.

SENIOR PRIVELEDGES 1970-1971

The senior class of Florida Military School have been granted the following Senior privileges:

- A. **Seniors** are allowed to walk across the parade field.
- B. **Seniors** are allowed to leave their tie out when in the winter uniform.
- C. **Seniors** may leave the bed spreads on their bunks hanging out.
- D. **Seniors** will be allowed to board the town leave buses first.
- E. The sidewalk in front of the dining hall is the **Senior** walk and no under classmen shall be allowed to use it except, when it is raining or the road is flooded.
- F. **Seniors** may stay up 30 minutes after taps in their rooms only.
- G. The one booth in the canteen designated as the **Senior** booth is for **Seniors** only.
- H. There will be town leave on Saturday nights for eligible **Seniors**.
- I. **Seniors** may visit the Stetson campus and library when escorted by a faculty member.
- J. A bus once a month will take **Seniors** and their sponsor to the Holiday Steak House for dinner, providing the seniors pick up their own tab and the time is approved by Col. Ward.
- K. Only **Seniors** may have a pen clipped in their top pocket.
